
LOOK UP TO

DEFINITION: to admire and/or respect

TXAMPLE: My cousins and I **look up to** our grandparents.



Look up to is a inseparable phrasal verb. This means that the object cannot be placed between the verb and preposition/adverb.



- ✓ We look up to them.
- We look our grandparents up to.
- ★ We look up them to.


Set forth: to explain

MAKE UP

MAKE UP 1 - constitute

Ex: People over 65 make up 30% of the population.

MAKE UP 2 - invent a story.

Ex: I don't believe you. You made the

whole story up!

MAKE UP 3 - compensate

Ex: May I leave work earlier today

and make up tomorrow?

MAKE UP 4 - end a disagreement

Ex: Paul argued with his sister but they made up later.





make up

to end an argument and be friends again
Pete and Ella had a huge fight yesterday.
They made up today, so everything is back to normal.



MAKE

make up

to invent an explanation for something, such as an excuse or a story, especially in order to avoid being punished

ns late to work again yesterday. My boss was angry, made up a story about my car breaking down.





to work at different times from the normal time of one's work due to not working enough during the normal times

She left work early on Tuesday and Wednesday, so she is making up the time today and working quite late.



make up

to combine together to form something larger
Children under the age of 12 make up 14% of the population in the USA.





Phrasal Verbs with MAKE

Make off

Hurry away, escape

The thieves made off before the police arrived.

Make up

Forgive each other

Alex and Mary angry yesterday, but they made up this morning.

Make for

Move towards

He already **made for** home when I arrived.

Make of

Understand, find a reason

I don't know what to make of his behaviour.

Make out

Decipher

Anybody can't make out her handwriting.

Make up

Invent, lie about something

Mary made up a story about why she was late.

Make up for

Compensate for something

I don't eat dinner but I make up for it at breakfast.

Make over

Do again

The teacher made him do his homework over.





Wake up vs. Get up



To stop sleeping and open your eyes.

EXAMPLES:

- I wake up at 7 o'clock.
- My alarm clock rang and I woke up immediately.





To get out of bed, usually to start your day.

EXAMPLES:

- I normally get up at 7.45
- I have to get up early tomorrow because it will be a busy day.
- I wake up at 6 and then get up five minutes later.

Go over

Look at carefully; to scrutinize; to analyze

E.g. Please go over the reports to make sure we

haven't missed anything. Go out

Leave, especially a building

E.g. Please go out through the back

door.

Go on

Continue in extent

E.g. The meeting seemed to go on forever.



Explode

E.g. The bomb went off right after the president left his office.

Go down

Descend; to move from a higher place to a lower one

E.g. You'll need to go down two floors to get to that

Go for

Try for, to attempt to

E.g. I'll go for the world record.

Apply equally to

E.g. Stop taking my food from the fridge! That goes for you too, Nick!


Be obscured by clouds

E.g. It's chilly now the sun's gone in.












