

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






BIO-PRINTING

It is already possible to 'print' three-dimensional objects out of plastic and metal using a 3-D printer. Now scientists are developing printers that will be able to print human organs and body parts. If they are successful, doctors



could save millions of lives. At the moment, scientists are able to print human tissue and bone, but the printing of whole organs will probably be a reality by 2025. Doctors are certain that bio-printing will revolutionise the treatment of cancer and heart disease. Moreover, if we can produce organs such as hearts and kidneys, patients won't die while they're waiting for an organ donor. The technology is very expensive and the cost might not come down for a while. But when it does, bio-printing could play an important part in all our lives.

Predictions about Future

I will graduate next year. It will rain tomorrow

Strong or Weak Predictions…

Phrases + Will / Won't

I'm Sure she will come to school.

I'm certain I will pass the exam.

He Will definitely do his best in the performance.

I'm fairly sure she'll be able to control her anger.

I think they will call soon. I think they wen't get upset.

I don't think they will get upset. -

I doubt they will get upset.

I Will Probably have a short holiday.

May/ Might/ Could

for

Possibilities about Future

(less certain)

I might sign up for classes.

It may be rainy tomorrow.

It could be dangerous to climb without guards.

May not/ Might not

for

Possibilities that something will NOT happen

I might not go to the party.
She may not show up at club.
It could not cause side effects.

First Conditional

Use first conditional to make predictions about future:

If it rains, the ground will be wet.

The ground will be wet if it rains.

Conditional clause	Result clause
If I'm late for school,	my teacher will tell me off.
(present simple)	(will + infinitive)

Usually: if clause (first) + , + result clause (second).

Also: result clause (first) + if clause (second).

Less certain predictions by:

may (not), might (not), could

She may find a better job if she searches more. If he practices more, he could be singer
