## Future with going to

Some examples of the future with going to (be going to + verb)

We're going to have a party next week.

Look out! You're going to burn that toast.

Where are we going to meet tonight?

She isn't going to win this time.



Present continuous form of go + to + verb

## They are going to win.

Positive			
I am / 'm going He / She / It is / 's going You / We / They are / 're going	}	to win.	
Negative			
I am not / 'm not going He / She / It is not / 's not / isn't going You / We / They are not / 're not / aren't going	}	to win.	
Questions			
Am I going Is he / she / it going Are you / we / they going	}	to win?	

We use the future with going to to talk about our plans or intentions.

He's going to find a new job.

He has decided to find a new job, but he probably hasn't started finding a new job. Harry and Jessica are having a coffee at college. They're taking their final exams this month. Use positive, negative and question forms of the future with *going to* to complete their conversation. Use short forms if possible.

JESSICA Are you going to study <sup>o</sup> (you/study) all weekend, Harry? HARRY No. *I'm not going to work* <sup>1</sup> (I/not work) on Sunday. I need some fresh air. *I'm going to go* <sup>2</sup> (I/go) to the seaside with Abigail. Do you want to come?

JESSICA I can't. I've got an exam on Monday morning. But <u>I'm going to spend</u> 3 (I/ spend) two or three weeks in Spain in the summer. What about you? Are you going to have 4 (you/have) a holiday? Abigail and I are going to find

HARRY No, I haven't got any money. <sup>5</sup> (Abigail and I/find) summer jobs.

JESSICA And what are you going to do 6 (what/you/do) after that?

HARRY Well, I've got a job in London, but *Abigail is going to stay*<sup>7</sup> (Abigail/stay) in America with her mother's family for six months. What about you?

JESSICA I'm not going to look \* (I/not look) for work in the UK immediately. Amy and I want to go abroad. We're going to teach \* (We/teach) English in Shanghai for a year.

HARRY That's a good idea. I'm sure it's a really interesting place to see.

We use going to to talk about our plans, and to predict the future. Ruby and Emma are sitting on a park bench. Add the words in brackets and the going to form of one of these verbs:

## say do do spend go work cook meet get up

- RUBY What are you going to do o (you) at the weekend?
- EMMA I'm quite busy, really. I'm going to work 1 (I) on the computer on Saturday morning. Then on Saturday evening I'm going to meet 2 (I) Daniel's sister for the first time. Normally she lives in New Zealand, but she's staying in England for a couple of weeks. What about you, Ruby?
- RUBY I'm a bit tired, so I'm not going to do <sup>3</sup> (I, not) anything on Saturday. But on Sunday morning, I'm going to get up <sup>4</sup> (I) early, if I can. I want to go to the market.
- EMMA Are you going to go 5 (you) with Grace and Lucy?
- RUBY No, only Grace. We're going to cook 6 (We) dinner on Sunday evening for Grace's mum, so we'll try to get something good to eat at the market. Lucy is going to spend 7 (Lucy) the weekend with one of her friends in Brighton or Cambridge.
- EMMA That's nice. Ruby, do you see that man? What's he doing?
- RUBY He's coming towards us. I think he's going to say <sup>8</sup> (he) something.
- MAN Excuse me, I've lost my dog. She's small and black. Have you seen her anywhere?
